OBJECTIVE

Learn different words by playing Battleships in pairs!

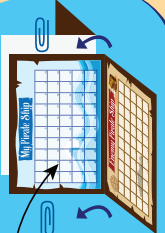
INSTRUCTIONS

Additional materials: Blu Tack, Pencils, Paper Clips

- Pop out the pirate ship maps along the perforated lines.
- See the little rows of blocks at the bottom of the left page? Those are your 'ships'. Pop those out too.
- Each 'ship' is made up of a number of squares. Using one letter per square, write a word in each 'ship'. For example, C A T or H A P P Y.
- Using blu tack, stick your 'ships' onto the 'My Pirate Ship' section. Make sure that your opponent can't see where you put your ships! You can stick them horizontally or vertically as long as the ships don't cover the numbers on the squares.
- Fold up the 'My Pirate Ship' section along the dotted lines so that it is upright.
- Next, place your pirate ship against your opponent's. Then, using paper clips, join them together at the top (see image).

HOW TO PLAY?

Try to sink your opponent's ships! Decide who goes first, and then guess where your opponent ships are by calling out the number of a square.
 If there are no enemy ships in the square that you guessed, it's a miss. Write an 'X' on the 'Enemy Pirate Ship' grid, in the square with the number you guessed. If you guessed it right, it's a hit!
 Your opponent should tell you the letter of the square you hit. Write that letter on the 'Enemy Pirate Ship' grid, in the square with the number you guessed.



DID YOU KNOW?

The word 'pirate' comes from the Greek word 'peirates', which means 'one who attacks ships'.
